

## Reconstructing Chetro Kettle (sic)

With the return of Sam Huddleston of the State Museum staff to the Chaco camp, reconstruction work on the recently excavated tower at Chetro Kettle has commenced and is going forward rapidly. The edge of the tower, which was standing above ground, was pretty badly torn down and spoiled. It is necessary to build up the broken sections in order that no more may fall. The supporting wall within which the tower kiva was built is also being repaired.

The installation of the narrow gauge lines has facilitated the excavation work and several more rooms are being cleared out. The finds of the week have been interesting. A bag of very peculiar shape is the most unusual. It is woven of some succulent plant which is very fine in a twill pattern. A number of other woven garments have been uncovered, and quite a lot of yucca string and cord of all sizes. Some of it was knotted about sticks. Some pieces of cedar bark, three beautiful arrow points, a bone awl and a wooden needle complete the list.

The evening lecture work has been interrupted this week by the departure of Mr. Harrington but will be continued with a series of reports by the students.

Pottery analysis is progressing. Miss Florence Haley who has been making a comparative study of the pottery from all Chaco Canyon ruins, has discovered a basis for classification and is completing her report. Miss Sara Goddard is a new recruit in the department.
